Order of Christian Funerals: For the Burial of Children

BIBLICAL READINGS

In the Easter Season the First Reading is traditionally taken from the New Testament, either the Acts of the Apostles or the Apocalypse. These readings are indicated by the suffix 'E' - NC-1E. In the published Lectionary the First Reading is paired with a Responsorial Psalm. This is a suggestion only and one of the other Responsorial Psalms may be used. The suggested pairing is indicated in the contents below by a reference in the list of readings - [P-1]. In a similar way there is a suggested pairing of Gospel Acclamation and Gospel and this is indicated in the contents below - [V-1].

We believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again.

Romans 14:7–9 Alive or dead, we belong to the Lord.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans The life and death of each of us has its influence on others; if we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord, so that alive or dead we belong to the Lord. This explains why Christ both died and came to life, it was so that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living.

Reading

1 Corinthians 15:20–23 All men will be brought to life in Christ.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order; Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him.

Reading

Ephesians 1:3–5 Before the world was made God chose us in Christ.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with all the spiritual blessings of heaven in Christ. Before the world was made, he chose us, chose us in Christ, to be holy and spotless, and to live through love in his presence, determining that we should become his adopted sons, through Jesus Christ for his own kind purposes.

Reading

1 Thessalonians 4:13–14. 18 We shall stay with the Lord for ever.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him.

With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.
